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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Supervisors
Oakstead Community Development District
Pasco County, Florida

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Oakstead Community Development, Pasco County, Florida (the "District") as of and for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the District as of September 30, 2005, and the respective changes in financial position, thereof for the fiscal year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 30, 2005, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, and contracts and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

The management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Our discussion and analysis of Oakstead Community Development District, Pasco County, Florida ("District") provides a narrative overview of the District's financial activities for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005. Please read it in conjunction with the District's Independent Auditor's Report, basic financial statements, accompanying notes and supplementary information to the basic financial statements.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The liabilities of the District exceeded its assets at the close of the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 resulting in a deficit net asset balance of (\$5,007,809).
- The District's total net assets increased by \$2,828,935 in comparison with the prior fiscal year. The
 key components of the change are reflected in the table in the following section.
- At September 30, 2005, the District's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$2,225,760, a decrease of \$(3,232,075) in comparison with the prior year. Of the total fund balance, \$2,423,201 is reserved for debt service and other items and the remaining unrestricted balance is a deficit of (\$197,441).

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis are intended to serve as the introduction to the District's financial statements. The District's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the District's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The statement of net assets presents information on all the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the government's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

The government-wide financial statements include all governmental activities that are principally supported by special assessment revenues. The District does not have any business-type activities. The governmental activities of the District include the general government (management) and maintenance functions.

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The District has one fund category: governmental funds.

Governmental Funds

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a District's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the District's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The District maintains seven individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the general, debt service Series 2000, debt services Series 2002, debt service Series 2003, capital projects Series 2000, capital projects Series 2003 funds. All of the District's funds are considered to be major funds.

The District adopts an annual appropriated budget for its general fund. A budgetary comparison schedule has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with the budget.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

As noted earlier, net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of an entity's financial position. In the case of the District, liabilities exceeded assets at the close of the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 resulting in a deficit net asset balance of (\$5,007.809).

The largest portion of the District's net assets reflects investment in capital assets (e.g. land, land improvements, and infrastructure), less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. These assets are used to provide services to residents, consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the District's investment in capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

An additional portion of the District's net assets represents resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used. They are funds set aside for debt service under the Bond Indenture. The remaining balance of unrestricted net assets is a deficit of (\$150,225).

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 management became aware of an error in recording capital outlay in its governmental fund types at September 30, 2004. Accordingly, the District has restated capital assets and related liabilities. There is no restatement required for opening net assets in the government-wide statements. More detailed information about the restatement is presented in the notes of the financial statements.

The District's net assets increased by \$2,828,935 during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 Key elements of this increase are as follows:

Program revenues, comprised primarily of assessments, decreased in comparison with the prior year. The decrease is the result of a decrease in prepaid assessments. As discussed in the notes, certain debt service assessments are collected in advanced and used to prepay a portion of the Bonds outstanding.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

The District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance related legal requirements. The District's general fund includes all activities related to providing management and operating services.

In the table below we have presented the cost of the largest functions/programs as a percentage of total governmental funds.

As noted above, debt service comprises the majority of expenditures for total governmental activities in the both the current and prior fiscal year.

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 management became aware of an error in recording capital outlay in its governmental fund types at September 30, 2004. The District has restated the capital project fund financial statements accordingly. There is no restatement required for opening net assets in the government-wide statements. More detailed information about the restatement is presented in the notes of the financial statements.

GENERAL BUDGETING HIGHLIGHTS

An operating budget was adopted and maintained by the governing board for the District pursuant to the requirements of Florida Statutes. The budget is adopted using the same basis of accounting that is used in preparation of the fund financial statements. The legal level of budgetary control, the level at which expenditures may not exceed budget, is in the aggregate. Any budget amendments that increase the aggregate budgeted appropriations must be approved by the Board of Supervisors. As of September 30, 2005 general fund expenditures exceeded appropriations by (\$157,157). The majority of the over expenditures were funded by the proceeds of a bank line of credit.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

Under Governmental Standards Board Statement 34 and related amendments, there is a requirement that certain capital assets be reported. However, the requirement permits certain entities to defer the retroactive reporting of its general infrastructure to a subsequent year. While the District does report its capital assets prospectively, it has elected to defer the retroactive reporting of infrastructure to a subsequent year. At September 30, 2005, the District had \$5,138,373 invested in land, water control systems, security, landscaping, buildings and furniture, fixtures and equipment. In the government-wide statements, accumulated depreciation of \$269,674 has been taken, which resulted in a net book value of \$4,868,699. More detailed information about the District's capital assets is presented in the notes of the financial statements.

Capital Debt

At September 30, 2005, the District had \$11,800,000 Bonds outstanding, a decrease of approximately 34% from prior year. In addition, in August 2005 the District executed a line of credit note agreement in the amount of \$350,000. Subsequent to September 30, 2005, the District issued Capital Improvement and Refunding Revenue Bonds consisting of \$6,520,000 Series 2006A-1 and \$5,780,000 Series 2006 A-2. More detailed information about the District's capital debt is presented in the notes of the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES

Reporting Entity

Oakstead Community Development District ("District") was created on October 19, 1999 pursuant to the Uniform Community Development District Act of 1980, otherwise known as Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, by Pasco County Ordinance 99-25. The Act provides among other things, the power to manage basic services for community development, power to borrow money and issue bonds, and to levy and assess non-ad valorem assessments for the financing and delivery of capital infrastructure.

The District was established for the purposes of financing and managing the acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of a portion of the infrastructure necessary for community development within the District.

The District is governed by the Board of Supervisors ("Board"), which is composed of five members. The Supervisors are elected on an at large basis by the owners of the property within the District. Ownership of land within the District entitles the owner to one vote per acre. The Board of Supervisors of the District exercise all powers granted to the District pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes. At September 30, 2005 certain Board members are affiliated with DEVCO IV, LLC ("Developer"). In addition, the Developer owns a portion of the land and the District is economically dependent on the Developer.

The Board has the responsibility for:

- 1. Assessing and levying assessments.
- 2. Approving budgets.
- 3. Exercising control over facilities and properties.
- Controlling the use of funds generated by the District.
- 5. Approving the hiring and firing of key personnel.
- 6. Financing improvements.

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") Statement 14, and Statement 39, an amendment of GASB Statement 14. Under the provisions of those standards, the financial reporting entity consists of the primary government, organizations for which the District Board of Supervisors is considered to be financially accountable, and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the District are such that, if excluded, the financial statements of the District would be considered incomplete or misleading. There are no entities considered to be component units of the District; therefore, the financial statements include only the operations of the District.

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The basic financial statements include both government-wide and fund financial statements.

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net assets and the statement of activities) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment is offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include 1) charges to customers who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services or privileges provided by a given function or segment; 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment and 3) operating-type special assessments that are treated as charges for services (including assessments for maintenance and debt service). Other items not included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES (Continued)

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources measurement* focus and the *accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Assessments are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are to be recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be *available* when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

Assessments

Assessments are non-ad valorem assessments on all platted lots within the District. Assessments are levied each November 1 on property as of the previous January 1. Certain assessments are collected upon closing on each lot sold and are used to prepay a portion of the Bonds outstanding. In addition, annual assessments are levied and collected to provide funds for the debt service on the portion of the Bonds which are not paid for from the prepaid assessments and to pay for the operations and maintenance of the District. The fiscal year for which annual assessments are levied begins on October 1 with discounts available for payments through February 28 and become delinquent on April 1.

Assessments and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Only the portion of assessments receivable due within the current fiscal period is considered to be susceptible to accrual as revenue of the current period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund

The general fund is the general operating fund of the District. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Debt Service Fund Series 2000

The debt service fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the annual payment of principal and interest on the Series 2000 Bonds.

Debt Service Fund Series 2002

The debt service fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the annual payment of principal and interest on the Series 2002 Bonds.

Debt Service Fund Series 2003

The debt service fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the annual payment of principal and interest on the Series 2003 Bonds.

Capital Projects Fund Series 2000

This fund accounts for the financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major infrastructure within the District financed with the Series 2000 Bonds.

Capital Projects Fund Series 2002

This fund accounts for the financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major infrastructure within the District financed with the Series 2002 Bonds.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES (Continued)

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation (Continued)

Capital Projects Fund Series 2003

This fund accounts for the financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major infrastructure within the District financed with the Series 2003 Bonds.

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the government's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets or Equity

Restricted Assets

These assets represent cash and investments set aside pursuant to bond covenants.

Deposits and Investments

The District's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand and demand deposits.

The District has elected to proceed under the Alternative Investment Guidelines as set forth in Section 218.415 (17) Florida Statutes. The District may invest any surplus public funds in the following:

- a) The Local Government Surplus Trust Funds, or any intergovernmental investment pool authorized pursuant to the Florida Interlocal Cooperation Act;
- b) Securities and Exchange Commission registered money market funds with the highest credit quality rating from a nationally recognized rating agency;
- Interest bearing time deposits or savings accounts in qualified public depositories;
- d) Direct obligations of the U.S. Treasury.

Securities listed in paragraph c and d shall be invested to provide sufficient liquidity to pay obligations as they come due.

In addition, surplus funds may be deposited into certificates of deposit which are insured. Any unspent Bond proceeds are required to be held in investments allowed in the Bond indenture.

Investments are stated at fair value.

The District records all interest revenue related to investment activities in the respective funds.

Inventories and Prepaid Items

Inventories of governmental funds are recorded as expenditures when consumed rather than when purchased.

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both government-wide and fund financial statements.

Deferred Charges

In a prior year, in connection with the issuance of certain debt, the District incurred costs totaling \$70,557. In the government-wide statements that amount has been capitalized and amortized over the estimated life of the Bonds.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES (Continued)

Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets or Equity (Continued)

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant and equipment, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, sidewalks and similar items) are reported in the government activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the government as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 (amount not rounded) and an estimated useful life in excess of two years. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Under Governmental Standards Board Statement 34 and related amendments, there is a requirement that certain capital assets be reported. However, the requirement permits certain entities to defer the retroactive reporting of its general infrastructure to a subsequent year. While the District does report its capital assets prospectively, it has elected to defer the retroactive reporting of infrastructure to a subsequent year.

Property, plant and equipment of the District are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

In the governmental fund financial statements, amounts incurred for the acquisition of capital assets are reported as fund expenditures. Depreciation expense is not reported in the governmental fund financial statements.

Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue includes a fee received in a prior year from a cable company for the right to market cable services within the District for a ten year period. The fee of \$135,000 is being amortized over a ten year period. As a result, franchise fee revenue for the fiscal year end September 30, 2005 was \$13,500 and the deferred revenue balance at September 30, 2005 was \$94,500.

In addition, deferred revenue includes \$72,000 of assessments levied but not billed and collected until a subsequent fiscal year.

Long-Term Obligations

In the government-wide financial statements long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the statement of net assets. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, are deferred and amortized over the life of the Bonds using the effective interest method. Bonds payable are reported net of premiums or discounts.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets or Equity (Continued)

Fund Equity/Net Assets

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Designations of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change.

Net assets in the government-wide statements are categorized as invested in capital assets, net of related debt, restricted or unrestricted. Invested in capital assets, net of related debt represents net assets related to infrastructure and property, plant and equipment, net of any related debt. Restricted net assets represent the assets restricted by the District's Bond covenants.

Other Disclosures

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 2 - STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Budgetary Information

The District is required to establish a budgetary system and an approved Annual Budget. Annual Budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles for the general fund.

The District follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements.

- a) Each year the District Manager submits to the District Board a proposed operating budget for the fiscal year commencing the following October 1.
- b) Public hearings are conducted to obtain comments.
- c) Prior to October 1, the budget is legally adopted by the District Board.
- d) All budget changes must be approved by the District Board.
- e) The budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.
- f) Unused appropriation for annually budgeted funds lapse at the end of the year.

NOTE 3- CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Cash

The District's cash balances were entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by a collateral pool pledged to the State Treasurer. Florida Statutes Chapter 280, "Florida Security for Public Deposits Act", requires all qualified depositories to deposit with the Treasurer or another banking institution eligible collateral equal to various percentages of the average daily balance for each month of all public deposits in excess of any applicable deposit insurance held. The percentage of eligible collateral (generally, U.S. Governmental and agency securities, state or local government debt, or corporate bonds) to public deposits is dependent upon the depository's financial history and its compliance with Chapter 280. In the event of a failure of a qualified public depository, the remaining public depositories would be responsible for covering any resulting losses.

Custodial risk – For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the District will not be able to recover the value of the investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The District has no formal policy for custodial risk. The District investments are not evidenced by securities that exist in physical or book entry form.

Concentration risk - The District places no limit on the amount the District may invest in any one issuer.

Interest rate risk — The District does not have a formal policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

However, the majority of the investments above are unspent Bond proceeds held by the debt service and capital projects funds. The Bond Indentures limits the type of investments using unspent proceeds.

NOTE 4 - RESTATEMENT

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 management became aware of an error in recording capital outlay in its governmental fund types at September 30, 2004. The District has restated the capital project fund financial statements accordingly. There is no restatement required for opening net assets in the government-wide statements. The following table summarizes the change:

Under Governmental Standards Board Statement 34 and related amendments, there is a requirement that certain capital assets be reported. However, the requirement permits certain entities to defer the retroactive reporting of its general infrastructure to a subsequent year. While the District does report its capital assets prospectively, it has elected to defer the retroactive reporting of infrastructure to a subsequent year. The District has incurred costs of approximately \$26,500,000 related to infrastructure improvements. Certain improvements have been or will be conveyed to other governmental entities.

NOTE 6 - LONG TERM LIABILITIES

Series 2000

On August 24, 2000, the District issued \$19,195,000 of Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds, consisting of \$5,675,000 Series 2000A Term Bonds due on May 1, 2033 with a fixed interest rate of 7.20% and \$13,520,000 Series 2000B Term Bonds due May 1, 2007 with a fixed interest rate of 6.50%. The Bonds were issued to finance the acquisition and construction of certain improvements for the benefit of the District. Interest is paid semiannually on each May 1 and November 1. Principal on the Series 2000A Bonds is paid serially commencing May 1, 2004 through May 1, 2033. Principal on the Series 2000B Bonds is due in one lump sum on May 1, 2007.

The Series 2000A Bonds are subject to redemption at the option of the District, in whole or in part at any time on or after May 1, 2012 at a redemption price as set forth in the Bond Indenture.

The Bonds are subject to extraordinary mandatory redemption prior to maturity in the manner determined by the Bond Registrar if certain events occurred as outlined in the Bond Indenture. This occurred on the Series 2000 Bonds as the District collected assessments from the lot owners and prepaid \$1,355,000 during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005. Subsequent to year end the District called additional Bonds for prepayment. See Note 12 – Subsequent Events.

The Bond Indenture requires that the District maintain adequate funds in a reserve account to meet the debt service reserve requirement as defined in the Indenture. The requirement has been met for fiscal year ended September 30, 2005.

The Bond Indenture has certain restrictions and requirements relating principally to the use of proceeds to pay for the infrastructure improvements and the procedures to be followed by the District on assessments to property owners. The District agreed to levy special assessments in annual amounts adequate to provide payment of debt service and to meet the reserve requirements. The District is in compliance with the requirements of the Bond Indenture.

Series 2002

On May 24, 2002, the District issued \$12,435,000 of Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds, consisting of \$4,995,000 Series 2002A Term Bonds due on May 1, 2033 with a fixed interest rate of 6.875% and \$7,440,000 Series 2002B Term Bonds due on May 1, 2007 with a fixed interest rate of 5.90%. The Bonds were issued to finance the acquisition and construction of certain improvements for the benefit of the District. Interest is paid semiannually on each May 1 and November 1. Principal on the Series 2002A Bonds is paid serially commencing May 1, 2004 through May 1, 2033. Principal on the Series 2002B Bonds is due in one lump sum on May 1, 2007.

The Series 2002A Bonds are subject to redemption at the option of the District, in whole or in part at any time on or after May 1, 2012 at a redemption price as set forth in the Bond Indenture.

The Bonds are subject to extraordinary mandatory redemption prior to maturity in the manner determined by the Bond Registrar if certain events occurred as outlined in the Bond Indenture. This occurred on the Series 2002 Bonds as the District collected assessments from the lot owners and prepaid \$3,110,000 during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005. Subsequent to year end the District called additional Bonds for prepayment. See Note 12 – Subsequent Events.

The Bond Indenture requires that the District maintain adequate funds in a reserve account to meet the debt service reserve requirement as defined in the Indenture. The requirement has been met for fiscal year ended September 30, 2005.

The Bond Indenture has certain restrictions and requirements relating principally to the use of proceeds to pay for the infrastructure improvements and the procedures to be followed by the District on assessments to property owners. The District agreed to levy special assessments in annual amounts adequate to provide payment of debt service and to meet the reserve requirements. The District is in compliance with the requirements of the Bond Indenture.

Series 2003

On October 29, 2003, the District issued \$1,560,000 of Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds Series 2003 due on November 1, 2007 with a fixed interest rate of 5.2%. The Bonds were issued to finance the acquisition and construction of certain improvements for the benefit of the District. Interest is paid semiannually on each May 1 and November 1, commencing May 1, 2003. Principal on the Serial Bonds is due on November 1, 2007.

The Bonds are subject to extraordinary mandatory redemption prior to maturity in the manner determined by the Bond Registrar if certain events occurred as outlined in the Bond Indenture. This occurred on the Series 2003 Bonds as the District collected assessments from the lot owners and prepaid \$1,550,000 during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005. Subsequent to year end the District called Bonds for prepayment. See Note 12 – Subsequent Events.

Series 2003 (Continued)

The Bond Indenture requires that the District maintain adequate funds in a reserve account to meet the debt service reserve requirement as defined in the Indenture. The requirement has been met for fiscal year ended September 30, 2005.

The Bond Indenture has certain restrictions and requirements relating principally to the use of proceeds to pay for the infrastructure improvements and the procedures to be followed by the District on assessments to property owners. The District agreed to levy special assessments in annual amounts adequate to provide payment of debt service and to meet the reserve requirements. The District is in compliance with the requirements of the Bond Indenture.

Bank Line of Credit

In August 2005 the District executed a line of credit promissory note agreement ("note") with a principal borrowing limit of \$350,000. As of September 30, 2005 the District had borrowed \$112,000. The note bears interest at a rate of prime plus one quarter of one percent (.25%) per annum and is due within six months of the date of issue. Subsequent to September 30, 2005, the District borrowed additional funds on the note and as of February 2006, the outstanding balance on the note of \$252,010 was paid along with interest of approximately \$3,960. The note has not been included in the following schedules.

NOTE 7 - DEFICIT FUND EQUITY

At September 30, 2005 the District reported a deficit fund balance of (\$150,225) in the general fund. The District expects to eliminate the deficit in the subsequent period upon collection of the assessments receivable and recognition of the related deferred revenue. In addition, the District reported a deficit fund balance of (\$47,216) in the capital projects Series 2002 fund. The District expects that the deficit will be eliminated upon recognition of the deferred franchise fee revenue in subsequent periods.

Transfers were made from the debt service funds where collection occurs to the capital projects funds to reimburse the fund for fees and other costs incurred.

NOTE 9 – DEVELOPER TRANSACTIONS

In a prior year the District entered into an agreement with the Developer to manage the recreational facilities and landscape maintenance for the District. The District paid the Developer \$ 61,424 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005 under the terms of the agreement.

NOTE 10 - MANAGEMENT COMPANY

The District has contracted with a management company to perform management advisory services, which include financial and accounting advisory services. Certain employees of the management company also serve as officers of the District. Under the agreement, the District compensates the management company for management, accounting, financial reporting, computer and other administrative costs.

NOTE 11 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by commercial insurance from independent third parties. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage over the past three years.

NOTE 12- SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to year end, the District prepaid \$20,000 of the Series 2000 Bonds, \$1,310,000 of the Series 2002 Bonds and \$10,000 of the Series 2003 Bonds. The prepayments were extraordinary mandatory redemptions as outlined in the respective Bond Indentures.

Subsequent to September 30, 2005, the District issued Capital Improvement and Refunding Revenue Bonds consisting of \$6,520,000 Series 2006A-1 and \$5,780,000 Series 2006 A-2. The 2006 Bonds bear interest at rates from 3.6% to 4.5% and mature at various dates through May 1, 2033.

The District is required to establish a budgetary system and an approved Annual Budget for the General Fund. The District's budgeting process is based on estimates of cash receipts and cash expenditures which are approved by the Board. The budget approximates a basis consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (generally accepted accounting principles).

The legal level of budgetary control (the level at which expenditures may not exceed appropriations) is in total. At September 30, 2005 actual expenditures exceeded appropriations in the general fund by \$(157,157). The majority of the over expenditures were funded by the proceeds of a bank line of credit.

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities and the major funds of Oakstead Community Development District, Pasco County, Florida ("District") as of and for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2005, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated September 5, 2006. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Oakstead Community Development District's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

However, we noted another matter involving the internal control over financial reporting that we have reported to management of the District in a separate letter dated September 5, 2006.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Oakstead Community Development District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, and contracts, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

However, we noted an immaterial instance of noncompliance that we have reported to management of the District in a separate letter dated September 5, 2006.

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REPORT TO MANAGEMENT

I. CURRENT YEAR FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Budget to Actual

Observation: The District exceeded budgeted appropriations.

<u>Recommendation:</u> The District should amend the budget such that actual expenditures do not exceed budgeted appropriations within 60 days subsequent to the end of the fiscal year end.

<u>Management Response</u>: Management will review current year spending to ensure that expenditures do not exceed appropriations.

II. PRIOR YEAR FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Budget to Actual

Observation: The District exceeded budgeted appropriations.

<u>Recommendation:</u> The District should amend the budget such that actual expenditures do not exceed budgeted appropriations within 60 days subsequent to the end of the fiscal year end.

<u>Management Response:</u> The amounts expended in excess of the budget were funded by the Developer. The District will adopt revised budgets in the future to reflect such additional sources.

Current year status: The comment will be repeated in the current year.

- 4. There were no illegal or improper expenditures that were not clearly inconsequential, discovered within the scope of the audit that may not materially affect the financial statements, except as disclosed above.
- 5. There were no deficiencies in internal control that are not reportable conditions, including but not limited to, improper or inadequate accounting procedures, failure to properly record financial transactions or other inaccuracies, shortages, defalcations, or instances of fraud discovered by, or that came to the attention of, the auditor, except as disclosed above.
- 6. The name and legal authority for the District are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.
- 7. The financial report filed with the Florida Department of Financial Services pursuant to Section 218.32(1)(a), Florida Statutes agrees with the September 30, 2005 financial audit report.

8. In connection with our audit, we determined that the District met a condition described in Section 218.503 (1), Florida Statutes. At September 30, 2005 the District reported a deficit in unreserved fund balance of (\$197,441) in the general fund and Series 2002 Capital Projects Fund. The financial emergency condition met was not a result of deteriorating financial conditions. We applied financial condition assessment procedures pursuant to Rule 10.556(7) and no deteriorating financial conditions were noted. It is management's responsibility to monitor financial condition, and our financial condition assessment was based in part on representations made by management and the review of financial information provided by same.
